
The pandemic saw many plans altered, including the postponement of last years elections. This has meant we have had to endure under another 12 months of ineffective Labour administration of this great City.

- The Bristol Energy Debacle, the spiralling costs of the Colston Hall refurb, the congestion charge about to cut our City in two!
- We will hold a referendum to let Bristolians decide whether to stick with the Mayor or go back to the Cabinet model.

In 2012 Bristol voted to have a Mayor—the only city in the country that did so.

It was hoped that this change would provide better leadership and stability.

It hasn't.

Instead the City has reeled from one crisis to another. £50m wasted on the energy company, housing targets missed, the Colston Hall refurbishment to cost another £50m, congestion charging about to dissect our City, libraries threatened with closure, parking charges with parks...

... the list goes on and on.

Under the old administration no leadership would have survived these debacles and yet time and again the citizens remain powerless to stop him.

We want to change this. We will hold a referendum to scrap the Mayor and bring accountability back to the Council House rather than this form or unaccountable dictatorship.

Voting for a Conservative Council and a Conservative Mayor ensures your democratic right to have a say on whether power is returned to the people or remains in the hands of an error prone Mayor answerable to no one.

Enough is enough.

Better transport for Bristol

For too long the Council has failed to get a grip on the City's transport problems bouncing from one pipe dream to another. Labour's £4bn underground proposal just isn't feasible - by working with neighbouring authorities and the Regional Mayor our plans are:

- We support clean air for Bristol but believe that the current proposals are flawed. We will lobby the Government to change the Clean Air Zone to remove the Portway from the plans - if these go ahead then it will cut our City in two.
- Work with neighbouring Councils to deliver on our rail ambitions for the Henbury Loop and Portishead lines.
- Continue to develop our rail plans with new stations at Horfield and St Anne's.
- Work in partnership with bus companies to expand frequency and services around the City not just to the City Centre.
- Develop a ring of park and ride facilities around the City to capture commuters further out and reduce traffic on our roads.
- Look to improve cycling provision with a series of targeted interventions that improve safety and encourage use - such as over the Downs.
- Speed up roadworks construction times 7 days a week/24 hour working where appropriate with closer coordination between Highways Agency and Bristol City Council.
- Clampdown on pavement parking. Where parking prevents access then fines will be levied.

More homes, better housing

The Mayor was elected on a promise to build more affordable housing. We were told it would be 800 a year. He has failed.

He managed little more that 300.

Conservative led South Gloucestershire Council is building nearly twice this.

He has over promised and under delivered. We can do better!

- Work in partnership with housing developers to bring forward developments that provide affordable housing.
- Use the Council's housing company to deliver the next generation of Council House construction.
- Ensure that developments also provide money for vital community infrastructure in the area they are built rather than the City Centre.
- Use the Council's powers to move van dwellers to permanent sites rather than allow informal sites to develop on local roads.
- Introduce licensing for all 'houses of multiple occupancy' across the city not just in certain areas.
- Stop the over-development of some of our key sites such as the Cumberland Basin and Hengrove Park. We want to develop the City working with, not against, local communities.
- We will listen to communities on how to make neighbourhoods safer for all.





Protecting & investing in local facilities

Time and again local services and facilities have been under threat from the Mayor. Libraries have been threatened, toilets closed and in some cases funding to children centres cut. This isn't how the City should be run.

- We pledge to never close a local library.
 Instead we will invest in the service to expand on the access card schemes already in operation in some libraries.
- We will invest in our secondary shopping centres across the City so more people have access to high quality retail areas to encourage local shopping.
- We oppose plans to close the Jubilee
 Swimming Pool in SE Bristol. This is a vital community asset and should remain open!
- We want Bristol to become a 'heart friendly city' with widespread availability

- of defibrillator and community training on how to use them.
- We will use developer contributions to kick start a widespread park improvement programme across the City so residents can access high quality open space.
- We want to improve public toilet provision across the city and reverse the Mayor's cuts to these much needed facilities.
- We will fairly distribute money across the City so communities have a real chance to improve their area rather than fighting over funding scraps.

Mark Shelford for Police Commissioner

- Reassuring Residents: I will reassure residents by increasing visible policing of our streets.
- Fighting Crime, not more Admin: The Commissioner's focus should be fighting crime, not administration.
- Boosting Morale & Officer Support: Police officers deserve a Commissioner who supports them in their vital duties.

SUPPORTING SAFER COMMUNITIES

The role of Police and Crime Commissioner for Avon & Somerset is a vital one if we are to drive down crime and make our streets safer. It's a big job. It matters who does it.

Having been a member of the region's Police and Crime Panel, I know what Bristol needs: more visible policing, with much more focus on reducing anti-social behaviour, violence and drugs crime on our streets. Burglary and car theft are increasing, and online fraud. We need to see better trained and equipped frontline officers freed up to prevent these crimes,

and able to do more to support victims.

I have served as an army officer with diverse police forces around the world. I want to use my skills and experience to serve all our communities, and make Bristol and Avon & Somerset a safer place to live.





Protecting our environment

During the recent lockdowns we have all come to value our local green spaces and environment more and more.

It is vital that more is done to preserve and improve our local amenity such as the Western Slopes in South Bristol.

- We will continue to work towards carbon neutrality across Bristol. Balancing the needs of our economy whilst protecting the environment.
- We will invest in a fresh anti-litter campaign across Bristol with more community resources, strategically located bins and more litter police to fine those that pollute our city.
- We will cut the cost of bulky waste collection for households in an effort to cut fly tipping.
- We will protect our green belt and oppose attempts to fence off local green spaces.
- We will develop a green bond scheme to invest in renewable energy schemes in our communities.
- We will not introduce parking charges at our City Estates - Blaise Castle & Oldbury Court.
 We do not support the idea of 'pay to play'.
- We will target graffiti vandalism and tagging which is blighting certain areas of Bristol.
- Expanding allotment provision across the City. We know that many people want the opportunity to grow their own food and we want to help them do so.

A fair deal for families & children

The last 12 months have been hard on families. We will do everything we can to make life that little bit easier as we look to build back better.

- We will invest in sports provision across Bristol. Healthier life styles need to be supported and encouraged in light of the Covid pandemic.
- Play areas will be improved so that our children can access quality play equipment in their neighbourhoods.
- We will invest in additional support for children with special educational needs the mayor has let them down badly and we need to now rebuild that trust with their families.
- We will deliver a new secondary school in Temple Quarter by working with parents and lobbying the Department for Education. We cannot afford another Council that promises action and delivers nothing.
- We will work with businesses to kick start work experience placements for young people exploring career options.
- We will work with charity and community groups to tackle isolation amongst the elderly. After the last year we have all had enough of being alone.
- We are pledged to keep our children's centres open and will work to reopen any that have been forced to close.

We will act responsibly with your money. We will not waste tens of millions on vanity projects and pipe dreams.

£50million wasted on the Bristol energy debacle after years of warnings. They continually threw good money after bad.

We will invest in local parks and play areas so that all residents can enjoy the outdoors in safety. Colston Hall (Beacon Project) costs have soared with the taxpayer now on the hook for nearly £60m. Labour have lost control.

We will improve the standard of education in our City - lobbying for additional schools and investing in special educational needs. Special Educational Needs disaster across the City. The Court ruled against the Council and condemned their repeated failings.

We believe in getting the basics right - fixing potholes, repairing swings, cleaning up our streets rather than squandering money we don't have.

Huge payoffs for former Council Chief Executives when that money is urgently needed on the front line.

We will generate more housing for Bristol by adopting best practice and working in partnership with developers to deliver the next generation of affordable homes. Housing targets missed! In fact Conservative run South Gloucestershire is building nearly twice as many affordable homes as Bristol.

We will lobby the Government to review the Clean Air Zone - we do not believe that the Portway and Cumberland Basin should be included Clean Air Zone for Bristol expanded to include the Portway - this cuts the City in two and could push HGVs onto local roads.

We will cut the cost of the Mayor's office and hold a referendum so that you can decide whether we as a City should have a Mayor or not The spiralling cost of the Mayor's office at a time when he is cutting front line staff. These priorities just aren't in the interests of the City.

We believe that we should be investing in our communities. There are vital projects like road improvements that have been ignored. We will distribute money more evenly across the city.

Huge cuts to community funding when Neighbourhood Partnerships were slashed. Money that was vitally needed.

We will work with other neighbouring authorities to deliver the transport, housing, skills and jobs that we need to thrive as a region. Damaged relations with neighbouring authorities and potentially jeopardises future investment — **surely enough is enough!**
